The Meta-Research Day 2019 in Tilburg aimed to bring together those interested in studying the current state of meta-research, with keynote talks by Sarah de Rijcke on research evaluation, Ana Marušić on peer review, and John Ioannidis on lessons learned from meta-research. An interesting project was presented in one of the parallel sessions, the PSA (Psychological Science Accelerator) which is a multicenter laboratory network to conduct large scale experiments, for more information and how to get involved, see <https://psysciacc.org/>

3. The MiRoR conference "Meta-research for transforming clinical research" took place on Monday at the Académie Nationale de Médecine in Paris on Monday, November 25. The conference had a number of distinguished speakers, including John Ioannidis (Stanford University), Ulrich Dirnagl (Charité Berlin), Deborah Ashby (Imperial College London), Carl Moons (Utrecht University) and Philippe Ravaud (Université de Paris), all emphasizing the value of meta-research to improve current biomedical research practices and career incentives. This was the closing conference of the MiRoR doctoral training programme, dedicated to "Methods in Research on Research" in the field of clinical research. The meeting was a big success, finished by a round table discussion of a proposal by Frank Miedema (Vice Rector Research at Utrecht University) on new approaches to evaluate researchers.
